

Dear Friends,

Over the past year, the trumpet trees bloomed gloriously, and great-horned owls and red-shouldered hawks once again fledged young in our woods. Never before had so many people enjoyed these wonders at the Arboretum, with thousands discovering our gardens for the first time.

Today, we serve an expanded community with the experiences of nature and beauty that are now so vital in our lives. That the Arboretum became one of the few major gardens in the nation to remain open continuously throughout the pandemic is due entirely to the resourcefulness and commitment of an exceptional team. We also thank the Arboretum community—members, donors, and friends for the essential support that sustained us.

In this annual report, we review a strong year of accomplishment, particularly in our landscape. Last June, the Garden of Quiet Reflection reached completion, inviting contemplation and quiet enjoyment amid the mature canopies of our Asian botanical collections. Just east of Baldwin Lake, the new Forest Path invited visitors to journey through a botanically and historically rich forest. Both gardens are fully accessible to mobility-impaired visitors, and provide cool, shaded refreshment on our hottest days.

Arboretum education programs also adapted to serve our community. Yoga, tai chi and forest bathing—staged in our gardens with ample space—became a mainstay. Most importantly, when in-class learning became unavailable in our schools, the Arboretum's Nature Club operated continuously, offering the group learning and social connections that were otherwise limited for months.

The coming year promises so much. From new plantings across the landscape, to initiation of the Visitor Plaza project, we are creating the Arboretum of the future. Enhancing your experience and enjoyment is our aim, as is increased service to the diversity and richness of Los Angeles County. So much of our progress is made possible by your support. We thank you for being part of this remarkable Arboretum and the exciting times ahead.

Cultivating history, plants & more

Three major enhancements and additions will enrich the visitor garden experience in 2022.

Restoration of the **Reid-Baldwin Adobe** promises a new educational experience that will explore the multicultural history of this landmark structure and its site. Last year, progress included construction of the roofed veranda that existed during the Elias Jackson Baldwin era (1875-1909), as well as completion of a fully accessible path to the Adobe. The project, funded by Los Angeles County and the Arboretum Foundation, will reach completion in 2022. Following construction, plans are underway to restore the period landscape, 1900 ca, that served as an outdoor room and social space for the Baldwin Ranch. Interpretation for the site, to include interpretive sign panels and new tour programs, will focus on the lives of Hugo Reid and Baldwin, as well as the experiences and contributions of indigenous peoples and diverse ranch workers during Native American, Mexican, and early American periods.







All objects naturally break down over time, and library books are no exception. Thanks to the support of the Good Family Foundation, the Arboretum Library implemented measures to preserve and care for its oldest and most vulnerable books. The project involved performing a "condition survey" of the **Rare Book**Collection. The books were reshelved by call numbers with special attention to make sure they were snug enough to have support but not so tight that the books might become warped or crushed. Nearly 300 of the most fragile books and periodicals were rehoused in an archival box or wrapped with Mylar wrappers.

The **Forest Path** project was completed last June to expand the Arboretum experience with a fully accessible journey through the wooded landscape just east of Baldwin Lake. In 1936, Hollywood filming began with *Tarzan Escapes*, marking the first of dozens of productions utilizing this area's lush vegetation and "lagoon" to suggest exotic locales around the world. Later in the 1960s, Arboretum curators began developing an extensive cycad collection that conserves and showcases this ancient botanical lineage. Together with tree ferns, gingers, bamboos and towering eucalypts, the cycads contribute to an immersive experience of subtropical diversity. Scenic views of Baldwin Lake and abundant wildlife are complemented by interpretive panels that invite exploration of scientific and cultural themes, amid cool shade and horticultural riches. Proceeds from the Moonlight Forest Lantern Festival funded the path.



A Gift for the Community

The new Garden of Quiet Reflection was made possible by a generous gift from the Page family.

WHAT DO A librarian, the tech giant Apple, and a soft-spoken Monrovia couple all have in common? They were all key to the creation of the Arboretum's newest landscape—the Garden of Quiet Reflection. Located northwest of Meyberg Waterfall and across from Kallam Garden, a shaded path leads into a quote-inspired green space. Quotations of life wisdom from around the world etched on tablets, stones and a sun dial are set amid botanical collections representing the floras of East Asia.

"We always wanted to do something for the community," explained Margaret Page, who with her husband Dennis made a generous gift to create the Garden of Quiet Reflection.

The story of this garden began in 1998 when Dennis' sister Sharon Page, a Temple City librarian, died of breast cancer, leaving her brother and sister-in-law an inheritance that they invested in several companies, including Apple.

"Apple continued to go haywire," recalls Dennis. "After we bought it, it first split two for one, then seven for one, and then four for one." Margaret added, "We never really thought of it as our money." Ultimately, the value of the stock grew into the nest egg that would fund the Garden of Quiet Reflection.

The next chapter in the story involved a trip to the Cheyenne Botanic Gardens in Cheyenne, Wyoming where the Pages came upon a garden with quotes and a vision was born: To create a garden in the Arboretum where visitors could reflect on quotes of nature and wisdom in a beautiful and contemplative space. While the idea was born more than 10 years ago, it did not

become reality until the Pages looked at the value of their Apple stock nest egg and said, "We could do this!"

Fast forward to 2018, when Margaret approached the Arboretum team about creating and funding the new garden. Opened in June of 2021, the garden is designed to provide visitors a contemplative and quiet nature experience as they discover 14 quotations, each uniquely presented, along fully accessible pathways with seating. designed the garden.

Today the Garden of Quiet Reflection includes a Chinese cork oak (Quercus variabilis) dedicated to Sharon, without whom the landscape would not exist. The tree's canopy hovers above another tribute to Sharon: Two large stone tablets representing an open book, etched with the Cicero quote "If you have a garden and a library, you have everything you need." Her family fondly describes their sister and aunt as a world traveling librarian and a super Dodger fan who never missed spring training in Vero Beach.

The Arboretum has always

been an important part of the Pages' lives, from visiting as children, to family outings with their own children, to over 25 years of volunteer service by Margaret, who is still active today. Her many contributions include serving on the Historic Preservation Committee, as a school tour docent, and in leadership roles, including past President of Los Voluntarios, the Arboretum's volunteer organization.

"We're just so fortunate to have this large open space," said Margaret reflecting on what she enjoys most about the Arboretum. "I couldn't



pinpoint one thing more than any other. I love the Queen Anne Cottage. I love the orchid greenhouse. I love the Depot. I love our new garden. I love everything about it!"


Thanks to the Pages' generosity born out of Sharon's

New Plant Gems from Asia Up Close

RECENT ADDITIONS TO the Asia/North Temperate Plant Collection mark important progress in the development of the Arboretum's botanical collections. The north temperate focus of this collection makes it unique among all other Arboretum collections. This region occurs north of the Tropic of Cancer (23.5° N latitude) and is characterized by cold winters and warm summers with precipitation year round. Although the Mediterranean Basin falls within this region it has cool winters and warm summers with precipitation only in winter, making it a distinctive climate. Compared with Africa, Australia. Chile. and Mediterranean collections, this collection must be watered regularly during spring, summer, and fall. The region encompasses most of North America, Europe, Russia, and into central and East Asia. Most broadleaf trees of this region are deciduous, creating a distinctively different canopy appearance from summer to winter compared with other Arboretum collections.

New plants in the collection particularly worthy of a visit include the Chinese redbud (Cercis chinensis 'Avondale'), Snow Day® Surprise pearlbush (Exochorda 'Niagara'), igiri tree (Idesia polycarpa), Chinese emmenopterys (Emmenopterys

henryi) and boxthorn barberry (Berberis lycium) immediately north of Meadowbrook. In the new Garden of Quiet Reflection look for uncommon plants like dove tree (Davidia involucrata 'Lady Sunshine'), Bartzella Itoh peony (Paeonia x 'Bartzella'), Korean waxbells (Kirengeshoma koreana), redbud hazel (Disanthus cercidifolius). elegant maple (Acer elegantulum), Raulston's sweetshrub (Calycanthus raulstonii 'Hartlage Wine') and wheel tree (Trochodendron aralioides).

Long Live the Queen

THE ARBORETUM IS fortunate to have four historic structures that allow visitors to journey through time: the Reid-Baldwin Adobe, Santa Anita Depot, Coach Barn, and perhaps our crown jewel – the Queen Anne Cottage. Properly caring for these fragile resources, however, is no small feat and comes with considerable expense. Fortunately, the current generation of Arboretum leaders and supporters are committed to their preservation care, addressing deferred maintenance issues that accrued over prior decades.

Last fiscal year, the Arboretum conducted its first ever, online campaign, through Kickstarter, to restore the Queen Anne Cottage veranda. Dubbed "Long Live the Queen," the campaign raised over \$50,000 to complete restoration of the veranda's woodwork and surfaces. Additional work, to be paid through Los Angeles County sources, includes foundation repairs and restoration of marble flooring, with project completion anticipated in late 2022. This is a prime example of the County and community working together to ensure that future generations of visitors may appreciate this late 19th century landmark.




